# A "breath of fresh air" - LCMC National Gathering



"You'll find that LCMC is a *breath of fresh air*" is what I was told by one of my colleagues during our last semester of seminary in 2014. It was not very long after stepping out of the ELCA and seminary simultaneously into my first pastoral call that my colleague's premonition proved to be true.

A few months later my congregational council informed me, with what seemed to me at the time a misplaced sense of jubilation, that it was time to register for the upcoming annual LCMC gathering to be held that year in October in Des Moines.

Dreadful recollections and visions of past synod assemblies flooded my mind:

Those of division and exclusion. Of two different registration lines, one labeled "clergy", the other marked "lay". Two microphones, one on each side of the meeting hall. One marked *for,* and one *against* where embittered attendees bucked in favor, or not, of adopting whatever social statement was popular at the time.

October came and our congregational reps and I arrived in Des Moines for the 14th Annual Gathering: *Reason for Hope*. And *hope* is precisely what I found there. It felt like home. Perhaps even a little bit like our heavenly home. It was a place where I recognized familiar faces from seminary. Both classmates and professors stepping out together in faith onto a horizontal path of acceptability and accountability. A path where one eventually discovers, that *yes*! I can function and serve in the public ministry of the church where the congregation functions on the front lines of ministry...*free in Christ*!

The gathering turned out to be like what I imagine I'll find heaven to be like when I arrive there one day. A place where folks readily pray, praise and worship God together. It's a place to network and build relationships. It's a place where more time is allotted for engaging in a food packaging service project for the hungry called Meals from the Heartland, rather than having a front row seat to watch folks go head-to-head picking apart social statements and bucking to pass resolutions of their desires. In fact, LCMC strives each year to break the previous year's record of time spent for the business meeting, which typically purposely lasts just long enough to approve the annual budget and elect trustees.

This year, in Hilliard, Ohio, the 21<sup>st</sup> Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ Annual Gathering was held. The four-day event, "Speak It, Live It, Share It", featured keynote speakers, worship and Bible study, breakout sessions, vendors, and plenty of opportunities for fellowship and networking. Whether you're new to LCMC, or a long-time member looking to make new friends and reunite with old ones, the Annual Gathering is the place to be. ## 2021 Confirmation Retreat: October 21st-23rd Rasmuson Wildlife Conservation Center

On a beautiful autumn weekend we had fourteen students arrive west of Dupuyer, MT for a confirmation retreat many have been hearing the call for. It took some time to prepare but it came sooner than we thought. Four churches were able to take part, and in the future others plan to join us. We see the event growing and were greatly impressed by the attentiveness of the students. They sat and listened to everyone of us present catechesis throughout the weekend. They participated in small groups, played games, sang, and even completed a hike over five and a half miles. The students remarked about those that did not come had missed out. The weather could not have been better. We even had campfires at night and could listen to the hunters harvesting on opening weekend at the base of the mountains.

Pastor Robin Bjella of American Lutheran Church in Winifred, MT was our opening presenter. She talked about <u>the call</u> students had in our current country and culture. Most important maybe was the discussion the students had about the difference between joy and happiness. They remarked after Pastor Robin spoke that happiness had to be a fleeting emotion while joy was an attribute that faith makes constantly present because of Jesus. The students participation was remarkable during the first large group session and it continued through the weekend.

The next morning, Pastor Travis Powers of Our Savior's and St. Olaf Lutheran Church in Chester, MT presented on <u>the crux</u> of our belief, justification by faith. The kids listened again intently as Pastor Travis presented with his usual high energy. The kids were listening because they knew in those moments that it mattered to him. His words were close to the heart and he presented the grace and mercy we receive through Jesus Christ's death and resurrection. Following his conclusion we sent the students on a wilderness adventure that is a whole story in itself. To say as little as possible, we gave them directions and let junior high students lead the way back to a slot canyon containing a waterfall.

That afternoon Pastor Ken Waag of Faith Lutheran Church in Great Falls turned our attention to <u>the</u> <u>roots</u> of our faith after we took a rest and cleaned up a bit. What stood out was how he showed the faith of others being vital to our own journey. He reminded us about the people that prayed for years and years for each of us. They were a part of planting a seed needing to not only be planted but also given wings. He showed how firmly rooted the faithful can be in a world today. Where many feel trapped we are free and God gives hope and courage in the midst of the best and worst things. Then we ate, played games, and went to bed. We were all exhausted, but the pastors stayed up with our musician and cooks to celebrate the events success. We were all encouraged because it was apparent that the kids would not forget the weekend.

When we woke up on the final morning we had breakfast and began initial cleaning. Because many had traveled very far to get there we wanted to get them driving quickly. Our final session contained a testimony by Pastor Drew Nelson. He spoke about the fruit of the Gospel as seen in his own life and summa-

rized how what the others pastors spoke on was experienced in his life. Then we gathered around the Lord's Supper, sang the doxology, and we were blessed with a sending and promise of a next event (Perhaps skiing?! We thank God for the opportunity to share Jesus with the students and each other over the weekend. Many of us were brought into a new and even uncomfortable place but left without any heaviness. Instead we pray that we brought home the story of this journey that brings others with us to the foot of the cross daily.
