Grace to you and peace from God our Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Put not your trust in princes, in a son of man, in whom there is no salvation (Psalm 146:3).

Psalm 146 is the first of the final five hallelujah or praise psalms. The closing chapters of the book of psalms conclude with promises of the LORD setting the prisoner free, the LORD healing the brokenhearted, and the extolling of the LORD who

made heaven and earth, sun and moon and shining stars. In psalm 146, there are also words of warning to mankind who have a habit of putting our trust in the wrong places. The chief commandment is the first commandment and the words of warning expose our misplaced trust. This is then followed by lavish words of promise of what the LORD has done, does, and will continue doing to deal with sinners and our wayward hearts.

Inevitably, following the general election cycle in our nation, people will begin to post on social media platforms, "Put not your trust in princes, in a son of man, in whom there is no salvation" (Psalm 146:3). In a cursory observation, this is most commonly posted by those who's candidate lost. Maybe it is a way to lick one's wounds. Or maybe such a loss has the effect of repenting one back to the one true LORD in whom we find our hope, help, and salvation. It reveals that one had put their hope in a human being to help improve their life and their nation. Should we not have put our trust in the LORD for all things *before* the election? Should this not be a word to those whose candidate won even more so than to those whose candidate lost? Indeed, this is a word to all of us who vote. We all have fallen short of the first commandment and our particular political desires disclose that we had less trust in God regarding our earthly life and believed that some human being will at least make up the difference.

The NW District Council met on Sept 29, 2024 in Marion, Iowa. Here are the highlights from our latest council meetings:

- The resignation of District Council member Pastor Grant Crichton was accepted with regret. Pastor Dave Hall and Moe Bessey have indicated that they are unable to serve additional terms.
- Council members were asked to encourage our LCMC brothers and sisters in Christ to participate in the NW District, and specifically invite participation through service on the Northwest District Council or as a member of the District Coordination Team. We have three council openings, and two district coordination team positions available.
- New NW District brochures have been printed and board members are encouraged to use them as a communication tool when talking with congregations they pray for. Julie Smith, LCMC Coordinator for Districts and Fellowships, has also provided a PowerPoint that presents what LCMC is, how it is structured, etc. This will be another helpful communication tool.
- The Board approved the use of a NW District debit card to be used by the treasurer. This will enable the district to purchase a Zoom link which can be used for Sub Committee meetings.
- A new Giving tab is now available on the NW District website.
- A new job description for the District Coordination function will be available in January.
- The Youth Impact team is making final preparations for the upcoming SAVED event at Shoshone Mountain Retreat. We currently have more than 50 youth, and 65 registrants signed up!
- Accepted Pastor Robert and Debra Sinclair (Nampa, Idaho) as new individual members.
- The next NW District Annual Gathering will now be held at Yellowstone Alliance Adventure Camp near Belgrade, MT. Shelly Hauge has agreed to chair the sub-committee.
- The NW District hosted a hospitality hour at the LCMC Annual Gathering in Marion on Sept, 29th.

24th Annual Gathering & Convention Recap



Dear LCMC NW District Family,

The LCMC Annual Gathering is a wonderful time! From September 29 to October 2, 646 people gathered at FaithLife Church in Marion, IA, for Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ's 24th Annual Gathering and Convention.

How Can One Describe the LCMC Annual Gathering?

Trinity Lutheran Lewiston's congregational president, Arlan Matchey, created an Information Station in the Fellowship Hall following worship on Sunday, October 6th, to briefly overview our LCMC Annual Gathering 2024 experience. This station was a testament to the importance of our congregation's connection to a larger, supportive association of churches within the LCMC community. Your presence and participation are integral to our shared mission as members of an association of congregations and as individuals who are free in Christ, accountable to one another, rooted in scripture and the Lutheran Confessions, and working to fulfill Christ's Great Commission to go and make disciples of all nations.

Next time you see Arlan Matchey, the congregational president of Trinity Lutheran in Lewiston, ask him about his first Annual Gathering experience:

"Before I attended the gathering, I was unaware and lacked understanding. As a new congregational president, I gained the confidence, resources, and information I needed to serve my congregation better. I found the atmosphere to be very non-judgmental."

We learned from keynote speakers, participated in worship and daily Bible study, visited with our LCMC Ministry Partners about new partnership opportunities. and gleaned innovative ideas from breakout sessions. Especially helpful for us was FOUNDATIONS FOR HEALTHY AND EFFECTIVE CHURCH COUNCILS – In this breakout, Michael Faust helped us examine how we can be intentional in helping church council members become healthier as persons and more effective in the role they've been called to serve on the church council. This combination of health as persons and

effectiveness in our roles is a key aspect of enabling church council members, along with their pastors, to see and embrace the cultural moments before them in their churches and in our communities. The Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC) is not just a static entity but a living, growing community. Currently, there are 1001 congregations, including 813 in the US, 39 in various states and territories, and 16 in different countries. This growth is a testament to our shared commitment and faith.

Whether a long-time member or new to LCMC, you will make new friends and reunite with old ones. You can always expect to engage in topics and leave equipped to face the cultural challenges the local church faces.

Once again, I return feeling informed, refreshed, renewed, and spiritually reinvigorated for ministry. I pray that every member congregation of the LCMC Northwest District is stirred to action and will avail themselves of the upcoming opportunities to be more closely connected.
